

Additional Financial Aid Resources

Here are some suggestions of resources outside of the Foundation's scholarship programs that you can take advantage of to help finance your post-secondary education.

Planning for College

The first year of college can be stressful, scary, and overwhelming, but YouTube's video guide <u>A</u> <u>Student's Guide to Your First Year of College</u> is available to set you up for success.

Your first step in financing your post-secondary education is to complete the <u>FAFSA</u>: the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. This form may seem confusing, but you can use <u>NerdWallet's FAFSA Guide</u> to help navigate the process.

Learn more about preparing for college, types of financial aid, how to apply for aid, and how to manage the repayment of loans from <u>Federal Student Aid</u>, an office of the U.S. Department of Education.

The <u>New Hampshire Higher Education Assistance Foundation's Center for College</u> <u>Planning</u> is a network of organizations with years of experience in helping families plan and pay for higher education. The New Hampshire Higher Education Assistance Foundation also has a helpful <u>YouTube channel</u>.

The <u>New Hampshire Department of Education</u> has information available regarding questions relating to financial aid assistance or with the financial aid process.

The <u>Consumer Financial Protection Bureau</u> is a government agency created to protect consumers by providing the information needed to make smart financial decisions, including in regards to education.

Not sure what you want to study? Complete the assessment at <u>Find Your Calling</u> to find fantastic careers and the education you need to achieve your goals.

<u>UP NEXT</u> is a free texting tool that offers personalized support with college search, application, federal student aid, and loan repayment through automatic text reminders.

The U.S. Department of Education has a college search tool called <u>College Scorecard</u>, and the <u>American Association of Community Colleges</u> has a community college finder tool that may be helpful to students interested in a 2 year degree program.

<u>I'm First!</u> is an online community celebrating and supporting first-generation college students.

New Hampshire students previously in DCYF foster, relative, residential or shelter care placement should review the resources available from the <u>New Hampshire Department of</u> <u>Health and Human Services</u> and the <u>Students Transitioning and Achieving Results</u> program.

Do you need to ask your college for additional financial aid? If so, you may find <u>SwiftStudent</u> helpful. This program can help with financial aid appeals, providing both factual information about eligibility and industry-approved template letters for submission.

If your family is experiencing difficulty in paying for internet service and connected devices, you may want to look into the <u>Affordable Connectivity Program</u>, which is a federal program to help households to pay for the costs of internet service and connected devices.

Searching for Scholarships

Your college is the first place you should connect with when seeking financial aid. In addition to financial aid packages, many schools also offer talent scholarships that typically require a separate application. Head to your high school's guidance office and the local library to ask about local scholarship availability. You can also look for leads on local scholarships at rotary clubs, women's organizations, and your town's chamber of commerce.

Some **employers** offer tuition assistance for their employees, and sometimes even their employees' dependents. Ask your employer as well as the employers of your immediate family members what educational resources they have.

New Hampshire's Local Scholarships

- Yes, Every Student (YES!): a scholarship program administered by the New Hampshire Department of Education designed to help families and residents whose education was negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic
- <u>New Hampshire Needs Caregivers</u>: an initiative of the <u>New Hampshire Health Care</u> <u>Association</u> which includes coaching for training and job searching as well as financial assistance with licensing costs.
- The <u>Community College System of New Hampshire</u>: for students studying at New Hampshire's community colleges
- <u>The Black Lives Matter Manchester Achievement Scholarship</u>: for graduating seniors of Manchester high schools who identify as Black, African, or African American and plan to attend either a 2 year institution or a 4 year institution
- <u>The Black Lives Matter Nashua Achievement Scholarship</u>: for graduating seniors of Nashua high schools who identify as Black, African, or African American and plan to attend either a 2 year institution or a 4 year institution

- The League of New Hampshire Craftsmen: for students pursuing craft-related studies
- <u>Concord Hospital Trust</u>: for nursing or allied healthcare students

- The <u>New Hampshire Association of Broadcasters</u>: for students pursuing a career in over-the-air broadcasting

- The New Hampshire Higher Education Assistance Foundation's <u>NHHEAF Network</u> <u>Scholarship</u>: for college juniors and seniors with at least a 2.5 GPA
- The <u>New Hampshire Retired Educators Association</u>: for students studying education, English, or journalism
- The <u>New Hampshire Housing Authorities Corporation</u>: for current recipients of housing assistance from a New Hampshire housing authority
- The <u>New Hampshire Teachers of Mathematics</u>: for students studying mathematics, mathematics education, or elementary education
- The <u>New Hampshire Water Pollution Control Association</u>: for students pursuing a degree in water pollution control, environmental science, or civil engineering
- The Ann Theodore Foundation Scholarship: for residents of Manchester

National Scholarships

- <u>Fastweb</u> and <u>Finaid</u> are scholarship search engines that can connect you to more than 1.5 million scholarships.
- The <u>College Board Opportunity Scholarship</u> guides participating students through the college application process; students become eligible for scholarships as they complete key tasks.
- <u>Phi Theta Kappa</u> is the world's largest and most prestigious honor society for two-year college students. More than \$37 million in scholarships is available exclusively to members each year.

- Scholarship America's <u>Dream Award</u> is a renewable scholarship fund for financially needy students in their sophomore year and beyond who have overcome barriers in order to pursue their college education.
- The <u>Coca-Cola Scholars Program</u> is an achievement-based scholarship awarded to graduating high school seniors in the U.S. Students are recognized for their capacity to lead and serve, as well as their commitment to making a significant impact on their schools and communities.
- Each year the <u>Jeannette Rankin Fund</u> awards scholarships to low-income women, ages 35 and older, who are U.S. citizens or permanent residents pursuing an undergraduate education at an accredited college or university in the United States.
- The <u>Jack Kent Cooke Foundation</u> is a private, independent foundation dedicated to advancing the education of exceptionally promising students who have financial need.
- The <u>National Merit Scholarship Program</u> is an annual academic competition that awards scholarships to high school students that take the Preliminary SAT (PSAT).
- The <u>UNCF Achievement Capstone Program</u> supports high-achieving students who identify as Black, African, or African American; nominations for the program must come from current faculty members.
- The <u>Elks National Foundation</u> has several scholarship programs; some are exclusive to Elks members and their children and grandchildren, while others are open to all high school seniors.
- TheDream.US considers their <u>National Scholarship</u> program to be a Pell Grant equivalent for undocumented students. GPA and test scores are considered but emphasis is placed on candidates' commitment to community service and ability to overcome barriers.
- The <u>Voyager Scholarship</u>, provided by the Obama Foundation, gives college students financial aid to alleviate the burden of college debt, meaningful travel experiences to expand their horizons, and a network of mentors and leaders to support them.

Tuition Assistance

- The <u>Community College System of New Hampshire</u> has many tuition waver programs including (but not limited to) New Hampshire high school valedictorians, foster children, New Hampshire National Guard members, senior citizens, and New Hampshire scholars.
- New England students are eligible for a tuition discount through the <u>New England Board</u> of <u>Higher Education's Tuition Break</u> program if they enroll in an approved major that is not offered by the public colleges and universities in their home-state.
- <u>Army ROTC</u>, <u>Air Force ROTC</u>, and <u>Navy ROTC</u> programs offer merit-based scholarships that can pay up to the full cost of tuition for students that complete military service after graduating. The <u>Coast Guard</u> also has a scholarship program for students that serve in the Coast Guard after graduating. Families of service members can also access scholarships through the <u>National Military Family Association</u>.
- <u>AmeriCorps</u> is a civil society program supported by the U.S. federal government, foundations, corporations, and other donors engaging adults in public service work.

Participants receive funds that can be used for tuition expenses or college loan forgiveness upon completion of the program.

- Teachers that complete a <u>Teach for America</u> program may qualify for national and regional scholarship and grants.
- <u>City Year</u> alumni are eligible to apply for an exclusive pool of over \$3 million in scholarships.

Earn While You Learn

New Hampshire has many apprenticeship opportunities that compensate students as they learn a skill or trade. Visit <u>ApprenticeshipNH</u>'s website to find a program near you. The US Department of Labor also has a <u>website</u> specifically for students seeking apprenticeships.

Job Training

Students in the Lakes Region looking for experience in a field that interests them can find opportunities through the <u>200 by 2020 program</u>, which aims to engage at least 200 businesses in providing experiential learning opportunities to Lakes Region students by the year 2020.

Repaying Student Loans

- To estimate your student loan payments after graduation, use a loan calculator like the one provided by <u>Mapping Your Future</u>.
- Unsure of how much student debt you have? The <u>National Student Loan Data System</u> is the U.S. Department of Education's (ED's) central database for student aid.
- The <u>Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program</u> forgives the remaining balance on some federal loans for employees of government or not-for-profit organizations.
- The <u>New Hampshire State Loan Repayment Program</u> provides funds to health care professionals working in areas of the State designated as being medically underserved and who are willing to commit and contract with the State for a minimum of three years (or two if part-time).
- If you are having trouble managing your loan payments each month, you may want to consider <u>consolidating your federal loans</u>. If you also have private loans, you need to follow a separate process to <u>consolidate your private loans</u>.
- The <u>National Institute of Health Division of Loan Repayment</u> will repay up to \$35,000 of educational debt each year for health professionals in biomedical or biobehavioral research careers.
