COURAGE IN COMMUNITY

New Hampshire Listens specializes in hard conversations — that are also productive.

For 15 years, New Hampshire Listens has been wading reporting on the state's civic health — and much into the difficult places.

New Hampshire Listens is a nonprofit dedicated to creating opportunities for public engagement where all voices have a chance to be heard and thorny community challenges can be solved together.

Based at the Carsey School of Public Policy at the University of New Hampshire, New Hampshire Listens works with municipalities, school districts, community groups and more. It has helped police departments build stronger relationships with the communities they serve, helped increase community participation in public health coalitions, helped librarians manage challenging conversations, contributed to long-term

more. The Foundation is a longtime supporter of New Hampshire Listens.

Cofounder and executive director Michele Holt-Shannon said that the work has not gotten easier over time. But it has taken on a heightened importance.

"We're very polarized," Michele said. "But, where we are still all in the same place, where we can still disagree reasonably — is locally."

On a recent night, local folks gathered in the library at John Stark Regional High School in Weare to talk about belonging. The event was hosted by the school district's Coalition for Safety and Belonging. Just one-third of middle- and high-school aged students

surveyed in the district report feeling a sense of belonging in their school community — a key indicator for well-being.

New Hampshire Listens was initially engaged by the school district to facilitate difficult community conversations after racist graffiti, including threats, was penned on a school bathroom wall in 2022. The Coalition evolved from those conversations. Now, New Hampshire Listens has trained students, some as young as sixth grade, to facilitate discussion tables of students, educators and community members to try to answer the question: "How can we make sure all students know they matter?"

(Indicative of the times: Michele has one eye on the

door, and a plan for how to defuse tension and include all viewpoints should anyone arrive to protest the proceedings).

Students facilitate the conversations with courage and determination and wonder — making sure that the people right here, at their tables, in their school library, listen to each other.

Eleventh-grader Charlie Matzke said she and her peers have learned "how to make sure everyone gets a chance to be heard."

Which might just be the first step to healing us all.

JOY IN COMMUNITY

Strong communities don't get that way by accident. They are built, over time, through thousands of actions that generate trust, and belonging, and occasions for joy.

The Community Builders' Hub, a new nonprofit in the North Country, is doing all of those things. The Hub hired three "community stewards" — all with deep local connections and a singular genius for the work. Mandy Bernd was a longtime bartender, Tara Giles a former newspaper reporter, Britni Haley held various roles in the hospitality industry.

Their first task: asking people what they wanted in their communities. "If the neighbors don't ask for it," the philosophy goes, "we don't do it."

The stewards' work is to be super-connectors, generators of ripple effects, reminders of what is possible, purveyors of hope.

In Colebrook, that looks like people working together to revitalize a community wellness center. In Milan, it's sixth-graders putting on a community dinner for elders. In Stratford, it's a coffee-andmuffins social before town meeting, where people spent some time on common ground before debating community issues. In Littleton, a night of bachata and merengue dancing — for everyone from babies to grandparents. In Berlin, a "PorchFest" where porches

are turned into concert venues and the city comes out to listen. And much more.

"When we do these things together, then we can work on the hard things together," Britni said.

In Whitefield, people asked for a skating rink. The rink had been a fixture on the oval that surrounds the town bandstand for generations. Its absence in recent years was keenly felt.

Tara went to the selectboard and offered to take responsibility for the rink.

A week later, on a January night when temperatures dipped to -20, people with more in common than they had realized were out on the town common with hoses, making something good for everyone.

A few weeks later, five-year-old Leroy Kenison suggested a school vacation skating party, and the community heard his voice. The skating party — with music and hot chocolate and milk crates and laughter - ensued on the common.

One skater stopped, and spread his arms, and said "We're really not that divided. Look at this."

STRENGTH IN COMMUNITY

Building Community in New Hampshire welcomes New Americans home.

Most American family histories include immigration stories. Here is Dhan Timsina's:

Dhan's family was settled in New Hampshire from Bhutan by the U.S. State Department. He got a landscaping job (and a driver's license) while he was still in high school, and drove relatives to their landscaping jobs.

After high school, he worked multiple jobs — as a personal care attendant for people with developmental disabilities, a manager for an in-home care organization, operator of a small grocery. His income helped his siblings go to college.

Now, Dhan runs a company providing in-home care services for elders and people with disabilities in

Concord and an adult-care center in Hooksett. His wife is a nurse, they own their Concord home. Dhan was named one of the Union Leader's "40 Under 40" young leaders in New Hampshire.

Dhan credits a large part of his sense of community, connection and success to Building Community in New Hampshire, a nonprofit started by Bhutanese refugees to help one another.

"I would not be here today if BCNH was not here," Dhan says. He now serves as the nonprofit's board chair.

BCNH has helped hundreds of people make community connections, build belonging in a new land, and find jobs and housing. The organization expanded its initial mission, extending services to help

immigrants from all over the world. Rajesh Chauwan, also originally from Bhutan, now runs a much-needed adult-care center in Concord. Suraj Budathoki serves in the legislature. Mir, from Afghanistan, was recently promoted at Pitco Frialator. Marina, who was a pharmacist in Ukraine, worked third shift in a factory while she learned English, and is then across part of India to Nepal on a flatbed truck. now working as a dental assistant. The Foundation and generous donors are longtime supporters of BCNH and other organizations that help immigrants build belonging in the Granite State.

"I am proud to be giving back to the community," Rajesh said.

But immigrant families, many of whom now have

deep community roots in New Hampshire, are living in a new climate of fear. BCNH is providing advocacy and support to help people navigate this perilous time.

Dhan's family was made stateless by the government of their country of origin. He was 22 days old when his family fled across the border on foot and When the family was resettled in Concord, they finally had a place to confidently call "home." Dhan's father looked at his son one recent morning and asked, "Are we getting deported, too?"

"No," said Dhan. "No..."

PURPOSE IN COMMUNITY

Volunteers come together to make nature accessible to all.

Many people come to New Hampshire — or choose to stay — for the state's natural beauty. Time spent in nature comes with real benefits, including reduced stress, improved mood, sharpened attention and increased empathy and cooperation. Nature is good for our physical — and emotional — health.

But nature is largely inaccessible to people with disabilities, including age-related mobility issues. A volunteer group in Ossipee is working to make sure that no one is excluded from nature.

The Friends of Constitution Park — led by supervolunteer Edwina Boose — started by bringing people together to revitalize a town park that had largely fallen into disuse. People who did not know one another before worked together clearing trails, raising money and making a disc-golf course, pickle-ball courts and a dog park — and now greet one another by name.

And people who still disagree with one another about many things voted overwhelmingly at consecutive town meetings to raise and appropriate a total of \$75,000 toward making Constitution Park's Deer Run Trail fully handicapped accessible.

Ossipee Lake is a jewel bounded by a ring of volcanic hills. The Deer Run Trail leads to the only town-owned

public access point to the waterfront. When work is complete, people in wheelchairs, with rollators or strollers will be able to reach the shore of Ossipee Lake and take in the sweeping view of the Sandwich and Ossipee ranges across the water. And the park is open to anyone — not just town residents.

The Charitable Foundation is helping to fund the construction of the accessible Deer Run Trail as well as similar projects around the state. The Foundation also supports the "Trail Finder" website that includes accessible trails, and technology that helps engineer trails for accessibility.

Matt Sawyer has been Ossipee's town administrator for more than five years — and his family has lived in Ossipee since the 1700s. The volunteer-driven Constitution Park project, he said "has brought people together like nothing else I have seen in my time here."

In July, volunteers will gather again — plumbers and businesspeople and teachers and retirees — and get to work making this natural jewel in this corner of New Hampshire accessible to everyone.

KNOWLEDGE IN COMMUNITY

Civics 101 teaches about the systems that make democracy work.

After the 2016 elections, opinions about how democracy works were running hot.

"People were having bar fights — but not admitting they did not understand basic civic concepts," said Nick Capodice of New Hampshire Public Radio.

And so a podcast was born. Civics 101 teaches civics in a style that is nonpartisan, engaging, intelligent — and occasionally hilarious. The weekly podcast originated at the small (but mighty) New Hampshire Public Radio, and is heard coast-to-coast — and around the world. Episodes have been downloaded more than 30 million times. In partnership with generous donors, the Foundation has been a longtime supporter of NHPR and Civics 101. Nick and co-host Hannah McCarthy have basically become America's coolest civics teachers.

"One of the most important things you can do as a citizen — as a person — in the United States is to understand how the government works," Hannah said. Civics 101, she said, strives to "be a resource for anyone who is seeking to strengthen civics education."

They make presentations in schools, are in high demand at civics and social studies conferences — and work closely with educators.

Donna Morin teaches at Alvirne High School in Hudson. She incorporates Civics 101 into her U.S. Government classes. Nick and Hannah Zoomed into her class during Covid and taught her students how to ma a podcast. Nick mentored one of her students through senior project.

"They are always willing to give to the community," Donna said.

Nine years in, Civics 101 remains on-point. A recer episode explored the rule of law — what it is and why is critical to democracy.

A 2025 study found that a startling 31 percent of Americans aged 18-29 reported not valuing core democratic principles and demonstrating some suppo for authoritarianism. Which is why doubling down

HOPE IN COMMUNITY

Community mental health centers help our kids thrive.

After the disruptions of the early Covid years, one thing was clear: A lot of the kids were not all right.

Teens reported increases in anxiety and depression. Teachers noted more behavioral health challenges among youngsters as early as preschool. While self-reported data from teens showed some improvement between 2021 and 2023, too many young people still struggle with a tangle of factors affecting emotional health.

New Hampshire's 10 nonprofit community mental health centers are key to helping our young people. The centers treat adults, families and children, regardless of insurance status or ability to pay. They help people in crisis — and help prevent people from reaching crisis. As part of a long-term strategy to improve behavioral health in the state, the Foundation is supporting that work, with children in particular.

In Nashua, mental health workers from Greater Nashua Mental Health go where kids need them. They work with early childhood teachers and summer camp staff on techniques for supporting young people. They offer counseling, programs and support groups and help young people learn how to feel comfortable in community.

Alyssa Pasciuto runs the center's RENEW program for teens who otherwise may "slip through the cracks." One of her clients was a straight-A student who worked as a grocery cashier and planned to continue doing so after graduation. Alyssa helped her to see her own strengths — and proudly recounts how she headed to college on a full scholarship.

Krystle Olson was a 20-year educator who retrained in behavioral health after seeing the effects of the pandemic. "I said, 'I can't keep teaching algebra, because these kids can't learn right now."

Krystle and colleague Hannah Fortin spend time each week in an early childhood center, mentoring teachers on strategies to help students.

One strategy is to hand children a picture of a cupcake with a birthday candle. Kids take a deep breath and pretend to blow the candle out. The mindful breathing technique, translated for toddlers, can be surprisingly effective. One morning, a preschooler had her hands on her head, wailing. Hannah handed her the cupcake picture. The child took a deep breath in and blew.

"She flipped like a switch," Hannah said. "She was able to explain that she was sad because she missed mom. She was able to re-regulate — even though she did not know what that meant."

One small victory for one small person on one day, perhaps. But that small person is now equipped with a tool that helps her thrive in her community.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

HELPING STUDENTS THRIVE

The Foundation awarded nearly \$8 million in scholarships to almost 2,000 students studying for two- and four-year degrees and professional certificates in 2024. The Mark and Diana McNabb Scholarship Fund is helping Oluwakemi Olokunboyo of Dover (pictured) study nursing at Great Bay Community College. The McNabb Scholarship helps women and others with financial need to go to community college or get training in a trade, with a preference for students in STEM fields.





ADVOCATING FOR EDUCATION

The Foundation filed an amicus brief in October with the New Hampshire Supreme Court in the ConVal school funding case, encouraging the court to uphold the fundamental right of every child in New Hampshire to receive an adequate education. It was the first time in the Foundation's 62year history that the organization has filed such a brief.

HOUSING FOR COÖS COUNTY

Homes NorthNH, a community-informed initiative of the Foundation's Neil and Louise Tillotson Fund, launched in 2024. Homes NorthNH is working to address the education, supports for nonprofit housing agencies and



CELEBRATING LOCAL ARTISTS

3S Artspace in Portsmouth serves as a local hub for creativity, grounded in an appreciation for the vital role contemporary arts play in the health of communities. In 2024, the Foundation partnered with 3S to host an exhibit and reception featuring works by the Piscataqua Region Artist Advancement Grant recipient and finalists. The Artist Advancement Grant recognizes the importance of artists living and working in the region, providing a financial award of up to \$25,000 each year to a Seacoastarea visual artist or craftsperson to promote their artistic growth.





dealing with the first 400 trees. Monadnock United Way, with the Loan Fund, launched a campaign to raise \$250,000 to finish the work. A Foundation grant, along with generous grants from Foundation fundholders, contributed \$63,000 toward the effort.



INVESTMENT REPORT

ALIGNING INVESTMENTS WITH PURPOSE AND VALUES

For more than six decades, generous New Hampshire individuals, families and businesses have entrusted their philanthropic assets to the Charitable Foundation. The Foundation has a track record of strong investment performance across changing economic times. We seek the best possible returns while working to avoid undue risk - maximizing dollars available to fund critical work in the New Hampshire community today, while prudently managing and growing those resources to maintain an enduring source of philanthropic capital. Our Investment Committee is also working over time to align our investments with our purpose and values.

In addition to the Sustainable Impact and Long-Term Pools, the Foundation offers a New Hampshire Impact Pool focused on providing long-term, patient capital to high-impact investments in our communities while achieving modest financial returns. It is in its early stages and performance reports are not yet available. To learn more, visit nhcf.org.

SUSTAINABLE IMPACT POOL

The Sustainable Impact Pool screens investments for sustainability and impact criteria and seeks strong financial returns over the long term. A portion of this pool will consist of investments that aim to have a positive impact in New Hampshire and surrounding states. Our investment committee works with Cambridge Associates to manage this pool.

LONG-TERM POOL

The majority of funds at the Foundation are invested in a highly diversified global portfolio called the Long-Term Pool. This diversification decreases risk and contributes to our solid performance record. Our investment committee works with Cambridge Associates to manage this pool.






Investment return generated AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2024


